


Generous Girl Scout Builds Beautiful Benches for Moonridge Animal Park

Discovered by keeper Andrew when he entered the enclosure, Valentine immediately tried to protect her egg by attacking him. Fortunately for Andrew, she could only access his pant leg, not his head.

Unfortunately the egg was left out in the elements too long and was frozen. Since eagles are capable of laying more than one egg, the keepers are watching closely for any new signs that this could be happening. In the meantime Valentine and Alaska have been provided with nesting material which they have put to good use. They are taking turns sitting on this egg and it remains to be seen whether there might be a second one coming.

The big question, of course, is whether there is a chance that the egg will be fertile. In the wild, eagles perform a rather complicated and beautiful mating ritual in the air. Since this is not possible, only time will tell.

Whatever the end result, it is wonderful to watch the pair exhibiting some of their natural instincts and parenting abilities.

As the new President of the Friends, I've had the privilege over the past few months to gain some insight in to what it takes to plan for a new animal park.

The new park, located on ten and one-half acres at the bottom of the golf course, will provide our animals with a much more natural environment. One which will allow them to live out the rest of their lives in enclosures much more suited to their needs



Christy McGiveron Navarre's friend and foe

When Master Keeper Christy goes anywhere near the adult wolf enclosures, Navarre goes on the defensive... hackles up, tongue-moistened teeth gleaming, lips rolled up, and tail straight up in the air. And Navarre means business too. He would like to eliminate Christy. Could this be real or just a fierce-looking bluff? After all, the other animals in the zoo love Christy, and always have.

It was 10 years ago that Navarre came to our little zoo. He and Christy and Debbie were the best of friends for several years. However, if you've seen the reaction that Navarre has towards Christy now, you wonder if they've ever been friends. When Navarre came to Moonridge Animal Park in late 2002, he was only months old. Debbie put him in the same enclosure as the older half-sisters Nova and Wakiza. All three Gray wolves came from a movie industry breeder.

As you can see from these 2002 pictures, Navarre was about ½ of his current size. Christie quickly established herself as the pack leader when Navarre arrived. How do you establish yourself as Alpha to a large male wolf pup? You pin him to the ground whenever he shows any desire to be the boss. Can't you just see him glaring at Christy in a halfplay move? Then "whack" he's upside down and pinned to the



ground with Christie staring him in the eye. Sounds kind of rough, but that's exactly what needed to happen. Young male wolves completely understand that action.



So, for the next couple of years, everyone was happy with the hierarchy. Then as Christy grew more pregnant with her unborn daughter, she became more cautious about entering the wolf enclosure with the three full grown Gray wolves. She was still the dominant one, but Christy couldn't bend down to pin Navarre to the ground very

easily now. Within several months, Christy stopped going into the wolf enclosure altogether. Her absence

opened the door for Navarre to become the dominant one. Just as in nature, when the Alpha leaves the pack, another male is ready to assume the job.

A couple of months later when Christy returned with her new baby daughter, she tried to reclaim her Alpha position. Nope, that just wasn't going to happen. Navarre was the boss now and no one was going to take his throne from him without a fierce battle. Naturally, Christy wasn't in a position to do battle then, and the stand-off continues to this day.

And Yes, much to our surprise, Navarre is the father of the 9 wolf puppies born here at Moonridge Animal Park in April 2009... but Christy didn't get one of the cigars...

Norman's not a bad guy...



What's New at our Zoo?


Norman, the Wood Bison, has a new enclosure to protect him from the weather.

The new possum exhibit is done, and Thelma is in it.

An artic fox, which was found on a rooftop in Beverly Hills, is now a resident of the Moonridge Animal Park.

The new Mews has been completed. For those of you who might be unfamiliar with the term, Mews is a British term which describes cages for birds, usually hawks. Our Mews is located down at the bottom of the park, on the way to the amphitheater.

Spring is here, and the Department of Fish and Game is once again reminding people to avoid handling any baby animals that they may encounter. Many people falsely assume that baby animals that they see need rescue. This is usually not the case – the adult animals often need to leave their young while they go out to search for food. In 2009, 537 fawns were turned into California rehabilitation facilities by well-meaning members of the public. Many of these fawns were healthy and should not have been disturbed. Disease is another reason that wild animals should not be handled. Wild animals can transmit diseases that can be contracted by humans, including rabies and tularemia, and also carry ticks, fleas and lice. The Department also reminds the public that wildlife belongs in the wild. As wildlife experts say: "If you care, leave them there."
