These animals are kept separately from the zoo's collection, and the keepers make sure they're not overly exposed to humans as a preventive measure to ensure they don't become dependent on people—they stay "wild" and can therefore be released to thrive on their own. Further, every effort is made to release these animals in their NATIVE habitats.

Unfortunately, most of the animals brought to the zoo for medical assistance have been hit by cars and left injured on the road. Some are other animal attacks, and some are unresponsive animals. We ask you to continue to be aware that this mountain is home to many, many species of wild animals.




The Beloved Betty White

Betty Marion White Ludden (January 17, 1922 – December 31, 2021) was a pioneer in American radio and television. She is fondly remembered in so many positive ways, and FOBBAZ is benefitting from her extraordinary love of animals. We have received donations in her name, and have created a "Betty White Memorial Fund," which monies are restricted to animal care. Each time we donate these funds to our zoo ambassadors, we will remember this exceptional lady with joy and thankfulness in our hearts.

Dar Larizadeh moved to Big Bear in 2015 with no plan on staying beyond that winter season...7 years later he still calls Big Bear his home and couldn't be happier. He became a docent that year with FOBBAZ and began spending a lot of his time volunteering at the zoo. A year later he was hired as a part-time animal keeper. He became a full-time keeper in 2018. That same year he presented a paper at the American Association of Animal Keepers in Denver on the different feeding strategies made available to our aging mountain lion sisters, Canyon and Cascade.

2020 was a pivotal year for the zoo; the relocation was now within sight. Preparing the new facility was an important task that Dar was heavily involved with—working overtime and on his days off, and he became one of the key players in the big move that occurred in September of that year. He has also taken on the role of Social Media coordinator—managing the zoo's Facebook and Instagram pages. Recently he's been tasked with website maintenance as well—updating and editing content.

Crossing the Rainbow Bridge

This is our way to phrase the passing of one of our beloved animals. We believe it offers a bit of hope, as a bridge always goes somewhere! Unfortunately, we must tell you of the loss of six of our friends.





Ben, a Steller's Jay (Get it? We have some *fiend-ishly* creative minds here at the zoo!), has been with us since 2020. His injured eye did not allow him to be released, as he was not able to thrive in the wild.



Mars, a Red Tegu (a type of monitor lizard), was brought to us by a collector in 2009. He was about 9 years old. No teasing about those jowls, please, as they cause female tegus to swoon with passion!



Merriam Webster, a Chilean Rose Tarantula, was donated to the zoo by a collector who was no longer able to care for her.

Robin Hood, a Red Fox, came to us in 2018 as an injured youngster.
Since Red Foxes are not considered an indigenous species here, we were not able to release him.





Motown, a Gray Fox, was found by Redlands Animal Control in 2009 as a baby and brought to us to raise. Because he was orphaned and didn't have a mama to teach him how to be a Gray Fox in the wild, he therefore became imprinted and unreleasable.



Narwhal, an Acorn Woodpecker, has been with us since 2017, when he was found injured and had to have his left wing amputated, thereby making him flightless.

Yes, We CAN!

Throughout the valley, FOBBAZ places Donation Cans in caring and sharing businesses. The money given by visitors to those businesses is reserved *strictly for medical care* for the animals at the zoo, and has just recently paid for surgery for one of our Red Foxes and keeps Huckleberry, our three-legged Black Bear, in Metamucil!
