BBAZ is proud to be a REHAB & RELEASE zoo!

Here is a listing of *a few* of our recent releases:

- 1-chipmunk—head trauma, unknown source
- 1-Cotton Tail—attacked by a housecat
- 1-Grey Squirrel—very bad case of mange
- 1-Red-tailed Hawk, flew into a window
- 1-House Finch—conjunctivitis (eye swollen shut)

The remainder of animals who've recently come in to rehab will be released when they've healed or remain with us at the zoo, and will be on exhibit ultimately.

These animals are kept separately from the zoo's collection, and the keepers make sure they're not overly exposed to humans as a preventive measure to ensure they don't become dependent on people—they stay "wild" and can therefore be released to thrive on their own. Further, every effort is made to release these animals in their NATIVE habitats.

Unfortunately, most of the animals brought to the zoo for medical assistance have been hit by cars and left injured on the road. Some other injuries are animal attacks, and some are unresponsive animals. We ask you to continue to be aware that this mountain is home to many, many species of wild animals, all of whom are vital to the environment.

Mama Tutu!

Since 1996, Big Bear Alpine Zoo and FOBBAZ have been in love with our wonderful mama grizzly bear and her two babies. Mama had a rough beginning, trying to stay alive after a 1984 wild fire ravaged much of the Wyoming wilderness in which she lived. Being a smart cookie, she rapidly learned that frequenting campgrounds where twolegged animals (i.e. people) always had food, but that got her into trouble with the law: Bear #163 was tagged and moved out of the area. As her original area was so "fruitful," she kept returning, thus being moved farther and farther away each time they caught her bluff-charging folks, etc. But when she came back a third time with two babies and continued to teach them her naughty (and very dangerous) methods for obtaining food, word was put out that there was a mother grizzly and her cubs who needed a permanent not wild home. Money to fly them here and to build their habitat came from across Big Bear Valley, the Inland Empire Chapter of Harley Davidson, the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, people from all over the world, and even the National Guards' Battalion 163. Those troops actually came up and helped with the excavation and building of the new habitat! Mama and her cubs arrived in California via airplane, and have called it home since. Mama (at approximately 38 years old) still watches over her two cubs, though they're now approximately 27 years old!


