BBAZ is proud to be a REHAB & RELEASE zoo!

Here is a listing of *a few* of our recent **releases**:

- Young Steller's Jay found in a street
- Screech Owl who came in with a wing fracture
- 3 Grey Squirrels, eyes closed and had fallen from their nest
- Ground Squirrel, orphaned but able to be released
- Pigeon who had flown into a window
- Chickadee who had been attacked by a cat

The remainder of animals who've recently come in to rehab will be released when they've healed or remain with us at the zoo, and will be on exhibit ultimately.

These animals are kept separately from the zoo's collection, and the keepers make sure they're not overly exposed to humans as a preventive measure to ensure they don't become dependent on people—they stay "wild" and can therefore be released to thrive on their own. Further, every effort is made to release these animals in their NATIVE habitats.

Unfortunately, most of the animals brought to the zoo for medical assistance have been hit by cars and left injured on the road. Some other injuries are animal attacks, and some are unresponsive animals.

We ask you to continue to be aware that this mountain is home to many, many species of wild animals, all of whom are vital to our environment.

What is a DOCENT?

The word Docent is derived from the Latin word *docere*, meaning "to teach." In many European Universities the term Docent refers to a specific academic appointment-typically below the full professor rank—equal to an associate professor.

In the USA, the term is more widely used to refer to a person who is knowledgeable and may conduct tours through a museum or zoo.

A Zoo Docent is capable of delivering information and answering questions that visitors may have. Docents are able to explain the zoo mission as well as promote respect for wildlife.

There are many ways to volunteer and support the Big Bear Alpine Zoo—being a Docent is one opportunity.




How many wolves can you find In this picture?
